

NFPB-MoH Re-Integration Document

As part of the insertion into the NFPB-MoH Re-integration document, specific gaps were identified and ways to address same were highlighted. These gaps, which were identified by the MER team were the absence of family policy; absence of mainstreaming family-friendly services into policies, plans, programmes and projects; absence of measuring family well-being; and limited (or lack thereof) statistics regarding the progress of family by type, socioeconomics and (dis) able abilities. Of important note is, it was stated that absolutely no Ministry, Department or Agency in Jamaica was poised to adequately address matters regarding family within the context of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) commitments, save for the NFPB.



Contraceptive Logistics Management Information System (CLMIS)

The team was successful at enabling the strengthening of the CLMIS through stringent monitoring, training and reporting, thus resulted in improvement in storage, record-keeping, forecasting, *inter alia*. Note that the findings from the CLMIS survey which the team had conducted, helped in the strengthening possibilities and led to the revision of the contraceptive registers and log books which were distributed to 318 health centres.

Planning

The saying goes, "all you need is the plan, the road map and the courage to press onto your destination" (Earl Nightingale). The team, having recogised the importance of putting hard work to planning continues to provide technical guidance and help in the writing of the NFPB's Strategic Business and Operational Plans; the Contraceptive Forecasting plan, which aims to enable accurate procurement of contraceptive methods for women within the reproductive age group (15-49) across the health regions. The goal of the plan is to ensure that the right amount of contraceptive methods



are available in the right quantity, at the right location and at the right time. There is also the preparation of the National Integrated Strategic Plan (2020-2025); the preparation of Jamaica Country Implementation Plan 2017 – United Nations Multi-

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Country Sustainable Development Framework; preparation for Health-in-All-Policies; the medium

-term socio-economic policy framework 2018-2021 (MTEF) — this is steered via involvement in the Health and Population Thematic Working Groups, whereby the development and prioritization of a compendium of national health indicators took place. The MTEF aims toward key goal achievements such as Monitoring



and Evaluation, Transformational Leadership, and changing of the mind-set of the nation. Other planning during the period involved the State of the World of the World Population event, under the theme: World's Apart: Reproductive Health and Rights in an Age of Inequality. The MER team was successful in arranging for the NFPB's Communication Unit to deliver a presentation on "My Mind and Me: Caring for Myself". Of note too is that the Director of the MER Unit, received on

Policies and Protocols

National Population and Development policy

In collaboration with the Planning Institute of Jamaica, the MER team played an integral role in providing information that would enable successful revision of this policy.

The National Data Confidentiality and Security Protocol

The National Data Confidentiality and Security Protocol, which is steered by the MoH, involves multi-sectoral agencies, including the NFPB. The MER team noted the top 10 foci being policy documentations, governance, review





security practices, responsibilities and training, security breaches, risk assessment, connectivity networks, data collection mechanisms, physical security measures, and data storage policy. As the way forward, a final report is anticipated. There is also slated to be an update of the electronic confidentiality security and access tool, the development of user manual of the open data kit, and updating of paperbased documents.

Surveys

Activities/Interventions by the National Family Planning Board, per Zone of Special Operation (ZOSO) – Mount Salem Community, St. James, Jamaica:

The team provided baseline information, conducted survey (in collaboration with the HPP team), analysed data and produced comprehensive report, which noted: Unintended pregnancy/Unplanned pregnancies, misuse of contraceptive methods, substance abuse, sexual coercion, inconsistent condom use, social vulnerabilities, early sexual debut, multiple partner, transactional sex, and limited knowledge of family planning methods.



Condom Market

The NFPB, in its desire to commission a Condom Market Survey, relied heavily on the MER team to develop the relevant Terms of Reference and coordinate the necessary process that would have been involved. This was to best ascertain the market size, availability, affordability, preferred brand/type, major stakeholders (local suppliers) and respective share within the market. This survey is pending.



Reproductive Health

A 12-page document regarding the Repositioning of the Reproductive Health Survey was developed, with a view to examining instruments of studies and survey in order to ascertain whether they contained sections that were parallel to the Reproductive Health Survey (RHS). Subsequently, the team developed a comprehensive terms of reference and was successful at obtaining first phase commitment for the execution of the RHS.
